## **Neil Armstrong**

Neil Armstrong will always be remembered for being the first man to step on the Moon. Armstrong flew to the Moon in the spacecraft Apollo 11 with two other astronauts, Buzz Aldrin and Michael Collins. Armstrong was the commander of the mission and was the pilot of the Moon lander, Eagle.



## **Moon Landing**

On 16 July 1969, the rocket Saturn V was launched from Kennedy Space Center in the United States. On board the rocket was the spacecraft Apollo 11 and three brave astronauts hoping to travel safely to the Moon and back. Millions of people across the world watched on television as Apollo 11 set off on its journey. Days later, on 20 July 1969, the lunar module Eagle landed on the Moon.



## **World War One**

The First World War saw fighting across Europe, Asia, the Middle East and Africa between 1914 and 1918. Also known as the Great War or World War I, it saw the introduction of new types of weapons (including tanks, aircraft and submarines) and new types of fighting. Battles were fought in terrible conditions and trench warfare was seen for the first time. No one had any idea how terrible the war would be or how many millions of people would be killed.
